Welcome and Recognition of New Members Kristi McAuliffe and Lorin Christensen

Chairman Bolach introduced the two new Members Kristi McAuliffe and Lola (Lorin) Christensen.

Public Discussion

Mr. Tom Treuter, 11 Oakland Park, inquired of the funding proportions to the DDA budget on the alley reconstruction project. City Manager Breuckman explained that the numbers for next year's budget are being compiled and that there are various ways to fund the project if necessary. Chairman Bolach added that the alley project will be a big part of the DDA budget. City Manager Breuckman added that the parking loan has been paid up and that those monies could be allocated.

Consideration of the 2015 Board Appointments

Chairman Bolach announced that the Board has to consider appointments to the positions of Chairman, Vice Chair, and Secretary.

Chairman Bolach volunteered to continue as the Chairman.

Commissioner Laidlaw volunteered to accept the position of Vice Chair.

Commissioner McAuliffe nominated Commissioner <u>Lenko</u> as Secretary and he accepted the nomination.

City of Pleasant Ridge Community Master Plan

City Manager Breuckman gave an overview on the Community Master Plan which includes goals, strategies, and the Future Land Use Plan. The preferred future will include maintaining the present character of Pleasant Ridge; quality improvement on Woodward Avenue; maintain financial stability and independence; accommodate existing and new demographic shifts; and have well-maintained recreational assets. Some of the goals/strategies are to come up with a parking strategy in the business district, missing middle housing, walkable/bikeable traffic, expand transportation options, monitor streets progress, maintain attractive neighborhoods, and high quality recreation programs.

Chairman Bolach opened the public hearing at 7:17 pm

Ms. Pat Gross, 70 Wellesley, inquired if there are any time tables for the different stages of the improvements to the parks. Breuckman responded that the Recreation Commission oversees that process and this year will begin the planning phase of the conceptual plan. Construction of the projects could begin in spring of 2016.

Chairman Bolach closed the public hearing at 7:19 pm.

City Manager Breuckman directed the Board to the proposed resolution in the packet. Chairman Bolach added that there have been several meetings that the Board has attended to better understand the proposals and commended Breuckman for the presentation of the materials.

Consideration of the 2015-2020 Capital Improvement Plan

Chairman Bolach mentioned that the necessary documents for review were emailed to the Board prior to the meeting. City Manager Breuckman also provided documentation from the discussions over the past month, and reviewed some of the financials for the projects. Breuckman also mentioned that this is the final step of the CIP process. Bolach added that projects under \$10,000 are not listed.

Commissioner Christensen commented that this is a "living document" and not set in stone, and the projects are prioritized upon necessity. Breuckman added that the prior year's recommendations are reviewed to see what was accomplished, too. Bolach mentioned that financing is key to determining what projects are to be completed.

Ms. Pat Corrigan, 31 Wellesley, inquired if the way the projects are listed on the document is the priority in which they are handled. Breuckman responded that the projects are ordered by year, chronologically. Bolach added that the streets infrastructure will be a higher priority than recreation, for example.

Commissioner Decoster inquired why the alley project was not listed and Breuckman explained that it was approved the prior year and is in the process of being completed.

Motion by Commissioner Decoster, second by Commissioner O'Brien that the 2015-2020 Capital Improvement Plan be approved and forwarded to the City Commission.

City Manager's Update

Breuckman recommended that the Board discuss the upcoming projects for this year. The budget process will begin in March.

Chairman Bolach suggested that all the committees should be reviewed and have members assigned. Sub-committees are good for obtaining necessary information to assist in topic discussions. Laidlaw suggested that committees only be 2 or 3 members. Commissioner Lenko suggested an Outreach Committee be formed for events and rebranding the DDA, something that is ongoing throughout the year. Bolach recommended that the Budget Committee be formed due to the fact the budget process will be starting in March. Commissioner Laidlaw added that the best direction is to have the City

provide necessary information on a regular basis to the committee so that a lot of time is not wasted for those who are volunteering in these roles of the DDA to try to obtain the information. Bolach suggested that if anyone has any questions to please email them directly to Breuckman so that the information will be provided in advance of a meeting. McAuliffe and Christensen recommended that there needs to be better communication with the business owners and they are willing to serve as the ambassadors to give them a voice. A current list of business owners will be compiled. Christensen would like to see better advertisement for the business district especially when there is a vacancy. Lengthy discussion held.

Commissioner McCutcheon inquired as to the proposed signage for parking lots and Breuckman responded that it is on the list of things to be done.

Other Business

Commissioner McCutcheon addressed the accessory dwelling units proposed ordinance and inquired as to why the City Commission voted it down after there was so much work and support by the Planning Commission beforehand. Commissioner Perry indicated that the City Commissioners reached out to the public and the overall feedback was that the residents did not like the feel and vision of rentals, additional parking issues, and did not want to see the City go in this direction. Bolach suggested that in the future if there is a topic that the City Commission may know in advance that it may not support to please inform the Planning Commission/DDA so that continued efforts and time is not wasted on something that is just going to fail in the long run; and, that maybe an item should be tabled to allow the Planning Commission/DDA to inquire of the City Commission what other information or public comment is needed to remedy any concerns before an outright denial. Commissioner Perry suggested that any of the Board Members can attend the City Commission meetings and voice their opinions. Bolach added that the recommendations the Board made on the accessory dwelling units were more or less to control the requirements and have restrictions, not to necessarily approve them overall. Laidlaw expressed concern that maybe there were 20 residents who voiced their disapproval of the proposed ordinance, but does that necessarily reflect the viewpoint of all the residents in the city who did not speak up. Breuckman mentioned that a lot of meaningful work and research was done that will not be wasted for the future.

Mr. Tom Treuter, 11 Oakland Park, added that he felt the Planning Commission and the City did a great amount of research in presenting and had meaningful discussion on the proposals for accessory dwelling units.

With no further comments or discussion, Chairman Bolach adjourned the meeting at 8:16 p.m.

Re: DDA, Public Alley Reconstruction – Devonshire to East Bound 10 Mile Road

The Downtown Development Authority, at previous meetings discussed the funding of the alley reconstruction project from Devonshire to East Bound 10 Mile Road, approximately 375 lineal feet of new pavement. Recently the building formally occupied by MBS and AAA was sold. The principal owners of the building continue to make improvements to the site, one being the parking lots and general beautification to the exterior of the building. To maximize the efforts of the new owners, it will be advantageous for the City/DDA to consider starting this alley improvement as soon as possible.

The City included the alley project as an alternate in the Oxford Blvd bid. With the cost of construction materials on the rise, it was not a surprise that the bids came in higher than previous estimates. Below is a cost breakdown for the public alley reconstruction – Devonshire to East Bound 10 Mile Road:

The City's engineering consultants; Anderson, Eckstein & Westrick, are exploring options that will attempt to lower the above total. In conjunction with that, the City will conduct a cost saving/benefit analysis on those options. I plan to have those alternatives in my hands by the middle of the week (March 24-26).

At this time, City Staff is not asking for a recommendation on an expenditure or financing plan for the reconstruction. By April we should have a better idea of all our options, and bring those to the DDA with a funding request.
