Allow me to first wish all residents of Pleasant Ridge a very Happy New Year. It is once again time for me to have the pleasure of reviewing the year just past.

2016 was a very productive and engaged year for Pleasant Ridge. The major accomplishment was the completion of the first major phase of the Gainsboro Park project. We await the arrival of Spring to complete the tennis and basketball court resurfacing. It is my hope that everyone who participated in the planning process sees their ideas reflected in the finished product.

Maintenance of the park and other aspects of the city will be the purview of Tim Schultz, our new DPW coordinator who was hired this past year. Tim replaced our Brilar-provided supervisor. Tim is doing a great job keeping the City looking nice, and we'll even save a few dollars by bringing some DPW functions back in-house.

The city continues to invest in infrastructure and capital improvements. This year brought a new roof for the Community Center, over 70 new street trees. and continued sidewalk maintenance and repair, all while continuing to improve our City's financial position by adding to our fund balance for the third year running.

Our Recreation Department,

under the leadership of Scott and Shawnie, with the assistance of Samantha Jenkins, focused on improving our recreation programming with great success. The summer camp reviews were "off the charts" with a daily average of 66 campers and maximum bus capacity attendance of 40 for every field trip. Pool attendance reached a new high with over 24,000 admits.

Next summer, we anticipate welcoming the 250,000th pool visitor since its 2004 opening. Pleasant Ridge produced two championship baseball teams (ages 9/10 and 11/12) and I was presented a team jersey from each (one of those special perks of being Mayor that I treasure). Our senior day trips were rejuvenated this summer and the result was consistent sellouts and senior bingo has been experiencing growth. Finally, the sense of community is nowhere more evident than in the recordbreaking attendance we have seen at our community events - Ice Cream Social, Halloween festivities, movie in the park, Christmas Tree Lighting and more. The number of young families who have chosen Pleasant Ridge to raise their children is more and more evident at each event.

Our Pleasant Ridge Police

Department, under the leadership

of Chief Kevin Nowak, demonstrates their competence and commitment to friendly service daily. They have participated in many multijurisdictional efforts this past year the latest being the porch package thief. Sergeant Rob Ried has been involved in many of these efforts and has done a tremendous job in moving our Neighborhood Watch effort forward. Officer Andrew Shelton received an award from MADD for outstanding achievement in his efforts to combat drunk drivers. On the operations side, the City was able to purchase, and completely outfit a Ford Explorer patrol vehicle. PR Foundation funding (more on the Foundation later) of \$10,000 allowed for the purchase of badly needed new in-car computers for all patrol vehicles. Finally, all PR officers attended more training this past year than in the three previous

years combined - including two

officers who attended an intensive

detective school. Supporting our

police with the equipment and training they require will go a long way in enhancing their ability to investigate the ever-changing criminal behaviors of our times.

The themes of "community engagement" and "sense of place" are most evident in our community volunteer organizations. Members of the Pleasant Ridge Garden Club work tirelessly on the parks and grounds of the City to make it a showplace in Oakland County. The Pleasant Ridge Woman's Club, through their highly successful annual Community Lasagna Dinner and Spring Brunch, provide scholarships to graduating seniors from Ferndale High School (10 this year). Let us not forget our residents who serve on the Planning Commission/DDA, the Historical Commission, the Recreation Commission, the Board of Review, the Library Board, and as Election inspectors. We would not be Pleasant Ridge without all of you.

Finally, I want to give a special thank you to the Pleasant Ridge Foundation. It was the Foundation Board who came forward to jump start the Gainsboro Park project with their donation of funding for the 25-year-old playground in 2015. This past year, thanks to an incredibly successful auction, money has gone for police computers and a key card system that will allow for earlier and later access to the Wellness Center so that residents can fulfill their New Year's fitness resolutions. I am told that the Foundation has some exciting plans for the coming year expect to hear more from them on that soon.

Once again, thank you for the opportunity and honor of allowing me to serve as your Mayor.



Cooperative Street Tree Program

UPDATE

The 2016-2017 school year is off to a great start! This semester we have had so many exciting things happening around the district that it is hard to pick just a few to highlight! We look forward to more positive and impactful things and events happening throughout next semester as well!

Our Ferndale High School Golden Eagles Marching Band headed to Ford Field in early November to defend their state championship title. With a score of 91.65, the Golden Eagles clinched their second straight state championship title bringing their total number of state championship wins up to 9 over the last 13 years. In addition to an overall win, the Golden Eagles won all three caption awards: Outstanding Music Performance, Outstanding Visual Performance, and Outstanding General Effect. Our Marching Band Director, Elon Jamison, pointed out something else: "While it is wonderful for the band to have earned their 9th State Championship in the last 13 years, I am particularly proud of this year's band because over 1/3 of the entire band are first-year marchers, and yet the group as a whole 'showed up for work' every rehearsal and got incrementally better each time. That's hard for any group to do, even far more experienced bands."

The Ferndale Eagle Football team also had an impressive season, finishing with a 7-2 record and making it to the State Playoffs! The Eagles went head-to-head with Detroit King at the end of October, and although they lost the game, the journey getting to that point is one worth noting. When Coach Royal started with Ferndale, there was waning interest in the program and as a result he had to move all interested junior varsity players up to the varsity team. Those 10th graders who moved up two years ago


are the biggest reason for the team's turnaround this year. "This 2017 class has set the bar high; they set the expectation for success. The three years they spent as Varsity players taught them a lot. Through their hard work and preparation, they have shown the underclassmen what it takes to be successful," said Coach Royal. Coach Royal was also recognized for his work with the team by being named Coach of the Year for region 16 by the Michigan High School Football Coaches' Association!

This semester, we also saw the start of the FIRST LEGO League Club at the Ferndale Upper Elementary School. We currently have 37 students participating! On November 14th, the Ferndale Blockheads (one of the four FIRST LEGO League teams at FUEL) presented their Animal Allies project to the Ferndale City Council. As part of an FLL project, each year, teams must do research on their subject in addition to the building of the robot. This year the challenge called on the teams to devise a unique solution to make interaction with their chosen animal (bats) better. The Blockheads made a request to City Council to pass a resolution pronouncing that the City be "bat-friendly" by encouraging its residents who have cut down trees to put up a bat house, plant native wildflowers, and provide a water source. Ferndale: soon to be a bat-friendly city thanks to the hard work of nine amazing kids!
