election 2017 info

BE PREPARED AT THE POLLS! Remember, Election Day is Tuesday, November 7, 2017. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Here is some information to help make Election Day successful.

The General Election will be held Tuesday, Nov. 7 for the purpose of voting on the following:

CITY COMMISSIONER – 2 seats: Sean Campbell • Alex Lenko • Bret Scott • Amanda Wahl

And for the purpose of voting on the following ballot question:

Proposal 2017–1 Police Pension Stabilization Millage Proposal (summary below)

Shall the City of Pleasant Ridge be authorized to levy up to an additional 1.40 mills (\$1.40 per thousand dollars of taxable value), for the purposes of funding currently underfunded police pensions. The millage shall be authorized for a period of 15 years with the first levy in July, 2018, provided that the City shall not be authorized to increase such levy by more than 0.35 mills in 2018, or by more than an additional 0.35 mills each year thereafter, up to the maximum millage herein authorized. The intent of this request is to allow the partial restoration of City Charter authorized millage which was reduced by Section 31 of Article IX of the State Constitution of 1963. The initial 0.35 mill increase would raise the sum of approximately \$50,750 in 2018.

Police Pension Millage Executive Summary

Why Is the City Asking For This Millage?

The City's police pension fund is 48% funded, with an unfunded liability of \$1.7 million. Today's problem started 35 years ago when benefit increases were granted in the early 1980s through the mid-1990s. Those benefit increases increased our pension liabilities, but contributions were not increased to pay for the future cost of the higher benefits. As a result, the City has had a growing unfunded pension liability over the past decade.

In 2015 the Municipal Employees' Retirement System (MERS) finally started to require municipalities to eliminate unfunded liabilities over a period of up to 25 years. While this decision by MERS was necessary, it has also caused Pleasant Ridge's pension payments to drastically increase, from about \$180,000 annually in 2014 to over \$425,000 by the early 2020s. This increase of about \$250,000 per year is nearly equal to the total payroll cost of our active police patrol officers, and the City cannot absorb these cost increases without having to make service cuts or raising new revenue.

Millage Overview

The City Commission has placed a request on the November 2017 ballot for a 1.4 mill increase in the City's general operating millage for a period of 15 years. This increase will cost the average resident about \$160 per year.

• The millage will phase in over a period of four years, increasing by not more than 0.35 mills per year until it is fully phased in. The millage will last for 15 years. We expect the City's pension to be fully funded when the police pension millage expires.

• The City's millage rate has been reduced about 0.5 mills each of the past two years by the Headlee Amendment. This means that if you are a resident who has lived in Pleasant Ridge for over 2 years you pay less in City property taxes now than you did two years ago. The average reduction in taxes paid to the City for a resident who has lived here since before 2015 is about \$120 per year. Even though property values have increased by 6-10% annually, City tax revenue growth is limited by the combination of Headlee and Prop A, and as such has only increased by 0.3% to 0.9% per year.

• The City will see another millage rate reduction next year based on the trend of this years' home sales. The expected rollback of 0.5 mills is greater than the phased-in 0.35 mill tax increase, so if approved we expect residents to still see lower City tax bills next year compared to this year. **CONTINUED ON PG. 5**

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. All voting will be at the Community Center, 4 Ridge Road, Pleasant Ridge, Michigan. All Michigan voters are required to show a photo ID at the polls.

ACCEPTABLE FORMS OF PHOTO ID INCLUDE:

- Valid drivers license
 Federal or State ID with photo
 U.S. Passport
- Current student ID from high school or college w/photo · Military ID with photo · Tribal ID with photo

If the voter states they have no valid form identification with photo, the voter may obtain a ballot by completing and signing an affidavit. If you have any questions, please call the City Clerk's Office.

ABSENTEE BALLOT INFORMATION

The Absentee Ballot can be mailed to your home, or any other address you desire. Absentee Ballot applications are available to Pleasant Ridge registered voters. You must fill out an application for each and every election before a ballot can be mailed to you.

You may request an Absentee Ballot for the following reasons:

- I expect to be absent from the community for the time the polls are open on Election Day.
- I am physically unable to attend the polls without the assistance of another.
- I cannot attend the polls because of the tenets of my religion.
- I have been appointed an election precinct inspector in a precinct other than the precinct where I reside.
- I am 60 years of age or older.
- I cannot attend the polls because I am confined to jail awaiting arraignment or trial.

The form can be picked up at the Clerk's office, requested by telephone, or in writing. When you receive the Absentee Ballot application, simply fill out the information. Return the form by mail, or in person. The ballot will be mailed to you at the appropriate time.

If you wish to receive an Absentee Ballot application automatically, you must contact the City Offices. Being placed on the permanent absentee voter's list will ensure that you receive an absentee voter's application for each election. It is Michigan Election law that you complete a new application for each ballot you receive. If you meet the above guidelines and desire to become a permanent Absentee Ballot voter, simply call City Hall.

where do i vote?

Remember, both voting precincts are located at the Pleasant Ridge Community Center,

4 Ridge Road. The Precinct boundaries are still the same. The precincts are divided by street:

The Community Center is arranged to accommodate both Precinct 1 and 2. Election inspectors will be available to answer any questions that you may have on Election Day.

The last day to register to vote for the November General Election is Tue., Oct. 10, 2017.

Note: Persons registering by mail are required to vote in person unless they have previously voted in person in the state or are at least 60 years of age or are handicapped.

Utility Bill Due Date

The **Pleasant Ridge utility bill is due Wed., October 25, 2017, by 5 p.m.** You can mail your bill before the due date, pay in person at City Hall, or pay your bill online. Be sure to have your bill handy to fill in important info: https://payments.g2gcloud. com/pleasantridge/582

Loose Brush Pickup

Loose brush will now be picked up on the third

Tuesday of the month. This change is necessary due to garbage pickup now being on Mondays. You may still place brush out at the street on Sunday, but it won't be picked up until Tuesday. Sometimes brush pickup takes more than one day. Please contact City Hall with any loose brush pickup issues.

Curbside Salt Delivery Now Available

Salt delivery will also be on the third Tuesday of the month from October through April. Residents can place a 5-gallon or smaller container at the end of your driveway and the City will fill it with salt. Please do not place buckets or containers out on Mondays as there is a good chance that your container will be taken with garbage/recycling pickup.

Utility Contractors

Utilities (DTE and the cable companies) have easement right to enter your property to work on the overhead lines. They have generally done this in a professional manner in the past, but in recent weeks we have experienced some issues with contractors working for ATT not working in a professional manner when on residents' property.

ATT informs us that all of their subcontractors are supposed to provide advance notice with contact info, and are supposed to have identification on them when working. If any contractor enters your property without providing advance notice and without having identification on them, please call the police at 248-541-2900, option 1 and they will remove the contractors from your property until such time as the proper notice and ID have been provided.

If you have issues with contractors damaging property, leaving messes, knocking out service, or any other performance-related issue, you must contact the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) and file a complaint. The MPSC oversees and regulates utilities throughout the state. Cities have been pre-empted from such regulation and oversight. POLICE PENSION MILLAGE EXECUTIVE SUMMARY, CONTINUED FROM PG. 2

What Has the City Done to Address Pension Liabilities?

The police and other City employees have agreed to a series of concessions from 2011 through 2017 that will create a sustainable long-term fiscal position for the City once the current unfunded liability in the pension fund is eliminated. These City actions and employee concessions include:

• Closing defined benefit pension police group O2 and administrative group 10 to new hires in 2011 and replacing them with new groups that have lower benefit levels. The new groups are fully or nearly fully funded.

• Police employee pension contribution increased from 0% to 2.5% in 2011. Administrative employee contribution increased from 0% to 3% in 2011.

• New police hires receive a hybrid plan that has a small pension component combined with a 401k-style defined contribution plan.

• City Manager pension group is closed. The current City Manager does not receive a defined benefit pension, but participates in a 401k style program.

Police Pension Millage Information Meeting

Tuesday, Oct. 17, 7 p.m. 4 Ridge <u>Road</u>

There will be a presentation about the millage, why it is requested, and what happens if it does not pass followed by time for questions and answers. The workshop should be about an hour or less.

• Retirement health care is no longer offered for any administrative employee hired after 2011 or police officer hired after 2017. Instead, employees have access to a Health Care Savings Plan that allows them to save for retirement health care costs with a small City contribution.

• The City has already made about \$80,000 of annual cost reductions to absorb the increasing pension costs to date.

What Happens If the Millage Is Not Approved?

The City cannot continue to provide the same level of services with the pension cost increases we are facing. The Police and Recreation departments account for over 55% of the City's total budget, and will be the most impacted by further cuts.

We currently have one full-time police officer position open. If the pension millage does not pass, that position may not be filled. It is possible that we may have to contract with a nearby police department to provide police coverage for a portion of the day. Cuts in recreation programs and city staff would be the next consideration to fill any remaining gaps.

I have enjoyed not only being a part of developing early literacy skills, but associating reading, at a young age, with the feeling of spending time with the people you love doing something you love. I was motivated to do this by both my mother and a poem.

Research shows that reading aloud is the single most important thing you can do to help a child prepare for reading and learning.

Why read aloud?

- **LANCUAGE DEVELOPMENT:** The number of words that a child knows on entering kindergarten is a key predictor of his or her future success.
- **INSTILL A LOVE OF READING:** Your example demonstrates that reading is important, pleasurable and valued.
- **KNOWLEDGE GAINED & SHARED:** Books are a pleasure, yes, and they are also informative. You and your child can learn something new as you read aloud.
- **LITERACY SKILL BUILDING:** Reading aloud builds literacy skills such as vocabulary, phonics, familiarity with the printed word, storytelling, and comprehension.
- **BRAIN DEVELOPMENT:** From birth to age 3 are critical years in the development of language skills.
- BONDING: Is anything better than sharing a good book?

In other words, reading that bedtime story may not only entertain and soothe a child, it may also develop his/her vocabulary, improve his/her ability to learn to read, and – perhaps most importantly foster a lifelong love of books and reading.

We know you want the best for your child, and we invite you to begin a parenting practice which will benefit your child the rest of his or her life – reading with your child at home 20 minutes a day from birth through elementary school. Children whose parents read with them learn to read well and are typically proficient readers by 3rd grade. It's as easy as that! Share the love of reading early in life.

2017 leaf collection

PR goes Solar

Solar power has arrived in Pleasant Ridge!

Our new rooftop solar energy system went live in September at the Community Center. The new 20 kWh system contains two arrays of solar collectors: one on the flat roof portion of the building, and one on the pitched roof on the southern portion of the building (visible from Woodside Park).

The system will generate about 32,000 kWh of energy a year, enough to offset about 20% of the annual electricity usage at the building. The payback on the project will be about 12 years, while the system is warrantied for 25 years and will





generate power for much longer than that.

The solar project combined with the recent LED lighting conversion at the Community Center means that our annual electricity usage will be reduced by about 40%. These projects are reducing our electricity bills, and also our impact on the environment.

Look for the new monitoring station in the lobby of the Community

Center. The display will show how much power the system is generating at the moment, along with its cumulative power output on a weekly, monthly, and yearly basis.

Your input is needed! Now that the Community Center solar project is live, our next step is looking at the restrictions on residential solar panels in our Zoning Ordinance. Currently, panels are prohibited on the front side of houses where they are visible from the street.



The Planning Commission is considering whether we should allow rooftop solar panels on the front side of houses. *Please take this extremely short two-question survey and let us know what you think:*
