







# city

**The 2018 State of the City is my fifth as Mayor of Pleasant Ridge. It is amazing how quickly time passes when you are having fun. Perhaps it is the fact that time passes more quickly as one ages, but I like to attribute it to the fact that I work with a wonderful city staff, am supported by a great Commission, and serve 2,500 engaged residents.**

### Infrastructure

With Ridge, Indiana, and Bermuda being rebuilt this past summer, all our streets are now finished and in great shape.

Our Community Center improvement project continued this fall and winter with the overhaul of the Big Room. With the outdoor patio project completed in 2017, we now have fresh, modern indoor and outdoor gathering space for residents and users of the building. If you haven't been up to the Community Center to witness the still in-progress transformation, you really need to see it. The update is quite amazing and will feature a new garage door opening to the patio. This will be a very popular event and gathering space, and please join me in thanking the Foundation for their leadership and financial partnership that helped move these projects forward.

We continue to make Woodward streetscape improvements. Next spring MDOT will be making improvements at the Oakland Park/Woodward intersection to make the pedestrian crossing across Woodward safer and more inviting.

Pleasant Ridge is home to about 2,400 total street and park trees. Our popular tree planting program continued in 2018, with over 100 trees planted, including the replanting of trees on Kensington, Elm Park Blvd, Ridge, and Indiana. We will be planting trees on Woodward Heights and Oakland Park this coming spring. Residents who live on other streets can get a new street tree through

our cooperative tree planting program (information about the program is included in this Ridger).

Finally, we improved our digital infrastructure with a new website which launched this past year. I hope you will agree that it is a major improvement.

### Events

It seems that each year brings new attendance records at all our traditional events, and this year was no exception. An increasing number of families with children are finding Pleasant Ridge the place to be because of our recreational and event programming.

Our senior programming continues to thrive. The day trip program continues to be a big hit with exciting adventures in Detroit highlighted by visits to several cultural venues and sampling some of the newest restaurants. Book early for future trips because they always sell out! Senior Bingo continues to be a winner, with record numbers enjoying the last event of the year that featured a terrific Thanksgiving Dinner with all trimmings. Well over 300 people attended each of the Ice Cream Social, Halloween Hayride, and Christmas Tree Lighting events and close to 150 residents got to see the newly refurbished "Big Room" at the Community Center as they shared Breakfast with Santa in early December.

We have many events put on by our wonderful volunteer groups – the Home and Garden Tour (Historical Commission); the Spring Brunch (PR Woman's Club); lectures, wreath and table decorations workshops, and more (PR Garden Club); and the annual Spring Auction and party (PR Foundation). While the PR Woman's Club was unable to have their Lasagna Dinner this past November due to Big Room construction, they will be sponsoring a Trivia Night fundraiser in January.

Our pool and summer programs also continue to thrive. Pool attendance in 2018 exceeded 23,500 visitors, breaking the previous record of 23,441 in 2012. Our Swim Team had 145 registered

participants and our summer camp registration was 107, with an average of 70 children attending every day. And, while I am not sure that records were reached, the Pleasant Ridge Synchro Show was terrific!

The Recreation Commission deserves our thanks for their diligent work on our recently adopted 5-year Recreation Plan. This plan is based on resident input gathered through online surveys and an in-person input exercise at the Ice Cream Social, and it will guide the city's recreation spending over the coming years.

In addition to the groups mentioned above, I want to acknowledge all the other volunteers who serve the city through membership on the Planning Commission/DDA, the Board of Review, the Library Board, and as Election inspectors. We would not be Pleasant Ridge without all of you.

### Personnel

I will finish by acknowledging all those who come to work each day and make Pleasant Ridge the special place that it is. We said goodbye to part-time Officer Julie Reid, who found a full-time position in the Village of Franklin, and we welcomed a new full-time officer, Jeremy Watters. We continue to update our police equipment and have taken delivery of a new Chevrolet Tahoe. In 2019 we will be purchasing body cameras for our police. The overwhelming support of the police pension millage in 2017 (81 percent Yes) has put us on path to eliminate our pension fund shortfall and provides budget certainty that allows us to continue to invest in our police department.

Finally, I send my sincere thanks for another wonderful year to Jim Breuckman, Amy Drealan, Scott Pietrzak, Evan Davis, Shawnie Stamper, Tim Schultz and all the staff at the pool and community center who make it easy for me and my fellow commissioners to do our jobs. You are the best!



## Street Tree Purchase Program

Residents who want a street tree planted in front of their house may participate in a cooperative purchase program with the City. The cost to the resident is \$125, or about 1/3 of the total cost to purchase and plant a tree. The City will cover the rest.

Residents who participate in the cooperative purchase program will have a tree planted according to the City's adopted Street Tree Planting Manual, which can be accessed at: [www.cityofpleasantridge.org/lsvr\\_document\\_cat/public-works/](http://www.cityofpleasantridge.org/lsvr_document_cat/public-works/).

Tree species are identified for each street in the manual.

**The deadline to participate in this program is Thurs., February 7.**

In order to be included in the order, residents must have payment to City Hall by that date. The trees will be planted in the spring, usually in April. Contact City Hall at 248-541-2901 with any questions about participating in this program.

## Effective Technology Integration Strategy

It is no secret that our students love tech. However, when it comes to finding the right technology to support student learning, the process may surprise you. Rather than leading with a device-driven mentality focused on Chromebooks or iPads, our educators integrate technology by focusing on content and instructional approaches appropriate for their students and letting those be the drivers behind the technology that they choose to utilize in their classroom.

Ferndale High School staff looked a bit puzzled when halfway through a "technology" professional learning session, they found themselves building

with Strawbees –plastic construction connectors that allow you to build prototypes of anything you can imagine using regular drinking straws. The inevitable question hanging in the air was, "What does this have to do with technology?"

Although we often think of technology as something shiny and new like a Chromebook or the latest iPhone, it is important to remember that technology is really any tool or material that has been developed to help us solve a problem or achieve a specific end result. Pencils and paper, whiteboards and markers, and even manipulatives like Strawbees are examples of technology, though perhaps not quite as flashy.

Building a lesson with effective technology integration is like crafting the perfect recipe of content, instruction, and technology tools. And, the results can be seen in so many diverse and exciting forms in Ferndale Public Schools.

- A high school science class is utilizing Cubelet robots to apply an understanding of modularity and computational thinking while collecting data through sensors for further study.
- Kindergarten students are building prototypes of an animal shelter using Strawbees and 3D pens.
- TCEC students are taking virtual field trips around the world using VR (virtual reality) headsets.

As these new tools are developed and access to them expands, they bring novel and exciting approaches to education. The possibilities are only limited by our collective imagination. With the additional support of our community and organizations like the Ferndale Education Association, teachers at Ferndale Schools are able to innovate and engage with students on a whole new level.




