FROM CITY HALL State of the City

Happy Spring, neighbors! I'll start the **2022 State of the City** where my predecessor Mayor Kurt Metzger left off. Our City is in a very good place, but oh my, it's been a year.

Over the past year we've seen tremendous progress in the fight against the coronavirus. Our national rate of hospitalizations and fatalities have dropped dramatically.

As I write this, nearly 800,000 people or 73% of our total population in Oakland County have been vaccinated. However, more contagious waves of this highly communicable virus continue to happen. I encourage everyone to visit www.oakgov.com to study the current statistics and decide what actions are best for your household. One of the best things about Pleasant Ridge is our sense of community, and I'm sure that we'll help each other through whatever remains of this moment.

I'm happy to report that all of our City's amenities are back without COVID restrictions, and

few new ones have been added over the last year. If you've not had the opportunity to experience the new pavilions at our pool and in Gainsboro Park, I encourage you to do so. They'll be fantastic places to host family and community events. We continue to attend to all of our City assets, but we are still experiencing challenges getting things done in normal time. Please be patient as we repair roads, trim trees and tidy the City.

The City remains financially sound, despite the delays, increasing costs and fluctuating weather patterns (yes, even rain effects our budget) that all cities are facing. Our budget is balanced, and we don't foresee any curve balls that might challenge this. As most of you know, the community voted on measures to fund the replacement of our aging water supply infrastructure, and from the advice of our Citizens Advisory Committee, a method to pay for the work has been accepted by the City Commission. You can find their recommendation and our budget on the home page of our city website. I am very grateful for their volunteerism and for the thoughtful way they approached the issue. One fantastic outcome of the last year is that more residents have taken to the streets, by foot! So many of us have used this period to change our daily routines, and a lot of us are regularly out walking our dogs, or our children, or with earbuds and Microsoft Teams. If you see a neighbor talking to themselves, they haven't gone mad, they're probably getting 2,000 steps in during a meeting. With the extra fresh air, you're spotting things you haven't noticed before, and we're seeing an uptick on calls to

As we shift our focus from where we've been to where we are going, you may be wondering what's in store for the next year? In a word... construction. This will cause short term disruption to our daily lives as we and others work to make improvements and progress. We appreciate your patience with the process. Here's what's coming over the next year:

• Work is scheduled to begin in Spring of 2023 on northbound Woodward in support of our steetscape project, which includes new

trees, improved walking paths, bicycle lanes, all in an updated and attractive arrangement.

• You will also see the start of the more expansive bike lane project in Ferndale in the Spring of 2023.

• Our water infrastructure project will begin next winter, or spring with the replacement of the water main and all lead service lines on Kensington.

• City Hall and the Recreation Center will be seeing some maintenance over the remainder of Spring and through Summer. We will be installing a back-up electrical power supply system so that the community center can serve as a landing spot in the event that there is a major outage in the city.

• We're also updating pool mechanical equipment.

• Our traffic management study for Woodward Heights has begun. The recommendations of this study will most likely be implemented this fall or next spring, depending on how much concrete work is required.

In all of these instances we will keep everyone informed about the project and what to expect. Projects with a

specific area of impact, like the Kensington water main, will be preceded by a dedicated meeting for the impacted residents.

There's lots of fun things in store this year too! This issue of the Ridger is packed with activities for practically every possible age and interest, and it never ceases to amaze me how wonderful our Recreation department is. Please visit our Recreation Center to hear about things that may get scheduled after the publishing of this Ridger.

Thanks to everyone for making my first several months as Mayor rewarding, and for doing what we always do... we make good stuff happen together. I am committed to keeping you informed, and part of the process as good stuff happens. *If you have any questions, thoughts, or feedback, please reach out to me directly at bscott@cityofpleasantridge.org.*



Summer Updates from City Hall

Woodward Projects

The Woodward streetscape and road diet projects will now begin in 2023. Bids came back very high, but we have received an increased grant from SEMCOG and MDOT to cover the increased costs. We will re-bid the project this fall for Spring 2023 construction. More information about these projects will be shared in the future.

Woodward Heights Study

The City has retained Toole Design to work with residents on traffic issues on Woodward Heights. Toole has collected and is analyzing background data. The next step in the process is to engage the community on this issue to hear your concerns and ideas. There will be multiple opportunities for residents to participate:

• A community survey will be open to all residents to complete regarding traffic issues in the community, with a focus on Woodward Heights-specific issues.

on Woodward Heights. This is intended for Woodward Heights residents. The stakeholder walks will be at 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. on Jul. 13.

- Thu., July 14 A community meeting to discuss traffic issues with the consultant team. This meeting is open to all residents, but it will be focused on Woodward Heights traffic issues. The meeting will be held at the breezeway at Iron Ridge, 660 E. 10 Mile Road.
- Sep. (date TBD) Toole will present and collect community feedback on their ideas for actions we can take to address traffic issues at an online videoconference meeting.

• Toole will take the community feedback from the September meeting and prepare their final report and recommendations. We expect this to be delivered in October.

Trom the OAKLAND COUNTY HEALTH DIVISION

The Best way to avoid West Nile Virus (WNV) infection is to prevent mosquito bites:

• Use insect repellent. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends the use of insect repellents containing active ingredients registered with the U.S.



Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Always follow the manufacturer's directions carefully.

- Be careful using repellent on children's hands because repellents may irritate the eyes and mouth.
- Wear protective clothing such as long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
- Limit outdoor activity from dusk to dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- Avoid areas where mosquitoes may be present (i.e. shaded and wooded areas).
- Maintain window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of buildings.
- Eliminate mosquito breeding sites by emptying standing water that collects in birdbaths, boats, buckets, tires, unused pools, roof gutters and other containers.
